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What's the value of venting polytunnels? By Haygrove



When and how to vent your polytunnels is a regular topic of conversation, and frustration, amongst berry growers. How often have you found yourself compromising a crop because labour was short, or you are assessing the cost vs benefit of venting?

Have you ever stopped and quantified the impact of NOT venting? What's the impact on yield and quality, ultimately on the bottom line by selling less Class 1? What's the impact on picking speeds, motivation of harvest team, P&D pressures, shelf life, buyer confidence, the list goes on...?

Sending a team of workers to manually push the plastic covers up the hoop is an expensive process and rarely is it possible to do at the optimal moment or with satisfactory frequency. What are the overall benefits to timely venting of polytunnels? Management of the temperature and humidity to create the optimal growing environment has been shown to lead to overall increase in both crop yield and quality.

A 5% increase in yield on a 60t/ha strawberry crop equals an additional 3t/ha. To put this into context, an average berry weight change from 20g to just 21g represents a 5% yield increase and an additional 3t/ha would give the grower roughly a 3–4-year payback on a Haygrove venting system investment.

But is an additional 5% achievable through better venting? You need to look at the marginal gains. What is the percentage gain through maintaining optimal photosynthesis rates? Through reducing the incidence of powdery mildew or other fungal pathogens through better climate management? In picking speeds through better quality? Through reducing leg row wastage from wind and rain events? It all adds up.

The economics of horticulture are changing. Labour costs are rising rapidly, and labour availability is decreasing. Investment in technology is needed to replace manual labour and those investments need to

be maximised. The expense of compromising crop yield, quality and timing through not venting is becoming less justifiable.

EZvent is Haygrove's solution to mechanised venting at field scale simplicity. Although an increased capital investment (compared to manually vented tunnels) EZvent optimises return on investment. With EZvent management of the internal environment allows each plant to thrive and reach its peak yield potential.

EZvent allows you to regularly operate the vents at the optimal moment without accumulating labour bills throughout the season. Growers using the EZvent endorse the increase in frequency of venting report impressive yield uplifts. EZvent users in the UK have seen up to a 20% reduction in leg row fruit wastage when connected to automated venting.

The patented design of the EZvent means that the installation time and cost is low compared to other mechanised venting systems. The vents can either be operated by mechanical chain drive or fully automated with electric vents connected to climate control sensors.

It's not just the economic environment that's changing, but the climate too. With rain becoming less predictable, the benefits of mechanised venting go beyond improving yield and quality, and season extension. The combination of EZvent tunnels fitted with Haygrove's rainwater gutters maximises the rainwater collection and mitigates the risk of irrigation failure through drought. By closing the vents during rainfall, the water catchment area increases to be the entire covered area.
