### Projects Update

*Tony Bundock*

On the 7th of November, PCA hosted the first of the National Horticulture Roadshow events in Adelaide. The funding was gained after a tender process with the initial intent to run events in Western Australia, South Australia and Queensland.

The original timetable was somewhat disrupted with the outbreak of Tomato Brown Rugose Fruit Virus with growers being hesitant to attend events where there may have been the potential for any cross contamination. However, with the outbreak issue having reached something of a hold pattern, the decision was made to hold an event in Adelaide at a neutral venue.

The event was scheduled to be held at Sneaky's Restaurant in Angle Vale, and was widely advertised through the PCA social media pages and a targeted email program using the 'Mailchimp' program. This was all co-ordinated by administration assistant Jade Lewis.

The organisation of the event was largely run by PCA Industry Development Officer, Matt Plunkett and PCA Project Officer, Tony Bundock. Rovensa Next and Muirs kindly sponsored the event.

The proceedings started at 2:30pm and were hosted by Tony Bundock and PCA Director, Alastair McLean.

The event also included the serving of finger food throughout the proceedings and the room set out included two large tables running the length of the room.

A total of 53 delegates attended the event with a range of growers and trade representatives. Tony provided an introduction to the event and acknowledged the National and local event sponsors. The new PCA membership rates and the upcoming conference were also highlighted and QR codes for membership and the conference were distributed across the tables to allow delegates to scan the code and access details.

Alastair McClean acted as MC to start the more formal proceedings and our first speaker was Dr Anita Marquart from Biological Services who provided a generic overview of the Integrated Pest Management Process.

This was followed by a more in depth view of issues associated with IPM from Stephanus Malherbe who also highlighted software that is available to assist growers in pest level monitoring. Stephanus also introduced the Biobest Academy which is a great learning resource for the principles and practices of Integrated Pest Management.

Following on from this we had Alastair Delooze from Denso presenting on current and emerging technologies for the Protected Cropping Industry. Alastair highlighted a number of developments that could be of potential use to the industry to assist in the IPM process.

The presentations were concluded with a grower panel hosted by Alastair McClean, and the panel was made up of Paula Yoshicawa, Vyras Thach, and Andrew Braham. This allowed everyone to hear first hand about generic issues impacting the individual growers as well as their approach to Integrated Pest Management.

The day concluded at 5:30pm after what was a really informative and productive day.

The next PCA / National Roadshow event is planned for Wednesday the 4th of December and will be held at the Warragul Campus of Community College Gippsland. Speakers at the event will include Channel 7 weather presenter Jane Bunn, who will highlight a bespoke weather forecasting program. Additional presentations will include the use of drones for the application of shade material on greenhouse roofs, the use of a web based platform for vegetable crop sales, and a technology update for crop production.



### Industry update: Tomato brown rugose fruit virus response in South Australia

The Department of Primary Industries and Regions (PIRSA) continues to respond to the detection of Tomato brown rugose fruit virus (ToBRFV) in the Northern Adelaide Plains.

#### Update to National Response Plan

National agreement has now been achieved on the National Response Plan to eradicate ToBRFV.

The Plan not only provides a clear approach to a return to trade for impacted South Australian tomato, capsicum and chilli growers but also the process for ToBRFV eradication within affected premises.

The Response Plan was developed by PIRSA in conjunction with other state and territory, and industry representatives on the national Consultative Committee on Emergency Plant Pests (CCEPP). It carefully balances the need to eradicate the disease while ensuring that the disease does not spread further while also ensuring a safe and measured return to trade for affected businesses.

The Plan details the destruction and decontamination process affected businesses

### Suspension of turf supply from the QLD fire ant infested area

The NSW Government has taken immediate action to mitigate the risk of fire ant movements into NSW by placing a temporary suspension of turf movements from QLD fire ant infested areas into ANY part of NSW.

The swift response follows the interception of fire ant infested turf at Clunes, near Byron Bay last Wednesday.

From Friday 15 November, turf importation from the QLD fire ant infested area will be suspended pending further investigations and compliance work.

Investigations continue; however, initial enquiries revealed the supplier involved in the recent interception produced all the required documentation for the Clunes turf delivery.

Since December 2023, over 762 record of movement declarations have been made for turf alone, documenting the movement of over 1.1 million m2 of turf into NSW.

The department published Biosecurity (Fire Ant) Emergency Order (No. 15) 2024 on 15 November 2024, including the temporary condition on turf. This supersedes Biosecurity (Fire Ant) Emergency Order (No. 14) published on 12 November 2024.
