# **Situation Reports - Industry Update**

As I write, it is pouring with rain and the radiation levels are extremely low...... It is kind of nice to get some reprieve from a busy and unrelenting production period that we have been in this season, but also negative in that supply levels can be disrupted by consecutive days of dull and overcast weather – so it is bitter-sweet. We have been fortunate that up until now the weather has been great and we have managed to keep disease and pest pressure under control. Therefore, quality and supply has been very positive this spring.

The only big ticket item on our mind and that of a lot of our neighbours and fellow growers is LABOUR! The shortage of skilled labour to harvest and process the crops is REAL and any effort to-date by state and federal governments have had little or no flow-on affect to ourselves or surrounding growers. We ran a 7 week advertising campaign looking for locals and received ONE genuine applicant – which we have employed and he is going tremendously well, but didn't fill the 20 jobs available. I am surprised as this is of national importance and directly relates to food security throughout Australia. Our current team is working very well and we have changed our production strategy to cope over the next 6 months but this is not a long-term solution. However, I encourage every single one of you to speak up and voice your concerns so that our leaders take our industry seriously. PCA wants to assist you but we need letters and examples for politicians to see first hand.

Being based in Metropolitan Melbourne has certainly presented plenty of challenges to running a business across the past few weeks. With strict lockdown protocols in place across the past 10 weeks travel has been highly limited, and don't even think about interstate travel!.



And that is a real issue when you run a training business that has predominantly relied on face to face training. So when you are presented with a roadblock, the best way forward is to work out how you can get over, under or round the obstacle. This has seen a lot of our work at Genesis Horticultural Solutions being delivered by video conferencing such as 'Zoom' so that we can keep the doors open.

On a positive note we have also been involved in training overseas with work being undertaken in India and United Arab Emirates to name a couple of countries. Coupled with this we now have many of our resources established on an online platform to make the training solutions more accessible to our customers.

But there are some things that can't be fixed with online solutions. Many of the growers in Victoria are facing severe issues with a lack of hands on workers with the supply of backpacker labour effectively drying up. This is seeing many growers withdrawing from replanting specific crops which will ultimately see a shortage of produce in the market.

Whilst there has been a lot of focus on the financial impact of Covid-19, there is also concern about the mental impact the whole pandemic and associated rules are having on everyone's health. As a collective, growers are a pretty resilient lot, but I know of a number of growers who really are at their wits end with the whole Covid-19 situation. Organisations such as Beyond Blue and the Blackdog Institute are doing sterling work in offering support to many.

However, with daily Covid numbers now in single figures, we are hopeful that these draconian lockdown measures will soon be eased and Victorian businesses will be able to function again.

Delving back into the world of Agronomy, here is a little insight.

As a Technical Agronomist covering most of Australia, but traveling exclusively within Queensland at this moment, I support a wide range of growers, including those under Protected Cropping. Unfortunately labour is the topic of the year, some of customers have ample, some are returning seeds or fertilizer because it can't be guaranteed they can harvest the crop. This isn't region or crop isolated either, it doesn't matter if they're large or small, they're all worried of running short. You aren't alone out there and I encourage our members to contact your local growers association to lodge your labour requirements for the season in advance with their government initiative labour programs. It's hard to predict, it's hard to plan, but a plan is certainly better than none.

I've also noticed a heavy lean on Agronomic advice for Hydroponics and Protected Cropping. I want to highlight there are a number of Protected Cropping courses now available to assist you in making a well educated decision about your crop. I encourage any members that are curious to reach out to the institutions offering them, or us here at PCA if you aren't sure where to look first.

In general terms we have seen low levels of investment in the greenhouse vegetable industry. This is most likely due to uncertainty surrounding restrictions imposed as a result of the COVID-19 outbreak. The effects of this has seen prices go up and down, as well as an effect on labour availability. Furthermore, with travel restrictions in places, it has been difficult to plan and realise projects.

The berry industry has been hit even harder, mostly due to uncertainty surrounding availability of seasonal labour - mostly backpackers.

The flower industry is one of the few industries that as a whole has seen a benefit from the large reduction in imported flowers due to the low level of international flights. This has been coupled with a strong demand in their products. Also the nursery industry in general has seen benefits from the fact that a lot of people have paid more attention on their gardens during lockdown and travel restrictions.

The medical cannabis industry has continued to develop, mostly with smaller projects being realised both in Australia and New Zealand. New Zealand is waiting on the outcome of the national cannabis referendum (due on 30 October).

# Fall armyworm marches AUSVEG held a webinar in late September to update horticulturists about the pest, how it be identified and chemical controls. The take

The worldwide pest, fall armyworm (Spodoptera frugiperda), known as FAW, arrived in Australia in February 2020 at that same time that the world's attention was focused on the spread of COVID-19. Like the virus, this moth and its larva rapidly spread across the country. It is now active across much of northern Australia from Bundaberg north and west to Geraldton with incursions reaching south into north-west New South Wales. It has been found on corn (foliage and cobs) and cotton as well as on rockmelon (fruit) but has the potential to feed on around 350 species including ornamentals.

FAW has spread from South America rapidly spreading through the United States to Africa (where it arrived in 2016) to parts of the Middle East, much of Asia and now Australia. Although it is a pest of warm climates, its spread is not restricted to the tropics and subtropics. During summer it can spread into colder areas. Each year it regularly spreads north from Florida and Texas in the US to Ontario in Canada but the cold winter conditions means it doesn't survive diapause in cold zones. With this pattern of activity recognised, there is every chance that FAW will reach all parts of Australia this summer and will be evident in gardens and parklands especially around coastal Australia. It could also spread to New Zealand.

update horticulturists about the pest, how it can be identified and chemical controls. The take home message from the webinar was that FAW has come to stay and we need to learn how to manage it in a sustainable way. As the insect is resistant to Group 1 chemicals and pyrethrum gives poor control, spinosad is recommended. In cropping, chemicals including Match and Proclaim are recommended in combination with pheromone traps. The insect has a rapid life cycle with eggs hatching in just a few days. A key control, especially on sweet corn and maize, is to spray the foliage where egg clusters are laid. Time sprays just prior to hatching to kill the larvae when they are small and as they begin to feed before they disperse over the plant. Work is also underway to identify possible natural biological controls.

# Key points

- Adult moths are nocturnal and can fly 100km in a night and up to 500km in their lifetime.
- Egg clusters are can hatch in as little as two to three days in warm conditions.
- Around 350 plant species are targeted by this pest.
- It has the potential to spread across Australia especially during summer.
